Survivors can get help applying for federal assistance and disaster loans, update applications and learn about other resources available. By the Numbers

- \$357.8 million in FEMA Individual Assistance approved for 191,508 households.
- \$40.9 million in U.S. Small Business Administration disaster loans approved.
- 37,000 National Flood Insurance Policy claims; \$55 million paid, including \$39 million in advance payments.
- 1,062 households with 2,716 members are checked into hotel rooms under FEMA's Transitional Sheltering Assistance for households.
- 409 Blue Roofs installed by U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.
- \$302 million in FEMA Public Assistance approved for emergency response costs

How to Apply for FEMA Assistance

Homeowners and renters in the following counties who had uninsured losses from Hurricane Ian may be eligible for federal disaster assistance. FEMA may provide financial help with temporary housing expenses, basic home repairs and other essential disaster-related needs.

- Eligible counties are Brevard, Charlotte, Collier, DeSoto, Flagler, Hardee, Hendry, Highlands, Hillsborough, Lake, Lee, Manatee, Monroe, Okeechobee, Orange, Osceola, Palm Beach, Pinellas, Polk, Putnam, Sarasota, Seminole, St. Johns and Volusia

There are several ways to apply: 1) DisasterAssistance.gov, 2) download the [FEMA App](#) for mobile devices, 3) call toll-free 800-621-3362. The line is open every day from 7 a.m. to 11 p.m. ET. Documenting Ownership and Occupancy

FEMA has taken steps to help owners and renters of disaster-damaged property validate ownership and/or occupancy as part of the application for financial assistance. It's Important to Submit the SBA Disaster Loan Application

FEMA may refer applicants to the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) with information on how to apply for a disaster loan. It's important to submit the loan application as soon as possible. If your application is approved, you are not obligated to accept an SBA loan but failure to return the application may disqualify you from other possible financial assistance from FEMA.

Transitional Sheltering Assistance

The state of Florida and FEMA have activated the Transitional Sheltering Assistance (TSA) program for Hurricane Ian survivors in Charlotte, Collier, DeSoto, Flagler, Hardee, Highlands, Hillsborough, Lake, Lee, Manatee, Orange, Osceola, Pinellas, Polk, Putnam, Sarasota, Seminole, St. Johns and Volusia counties. Survivors from these counties who have applied for disaster assistance may be eligible to shelter in a hotel or motel paid for by FEMA. Survivors will be notified of their eligibility through an automated phone call, text message and/or email, depending upon the method of communication they selected when they applied for assistance.

Understanding Your Letter from FEMA

Hurricane Ian survivors who applied for assistance from FEMA will receive a letter from FEMA. The letter will explain your application status and how to respond. It is important to read the letter carefully because it will include the amount of any assistance FEMA may provide and information on the appropriate use of disaster assistance funds. If you have questions about your letter, call the disaster assistance helpline at 800-621-3362 to find out what information FEMA needs.

If You Disagree with FEMA's Decision

You can appeal and provide more information so FEMA can continue processing your application. Call the Helpline at 800-621-3362 or visit a Disaster Recovery Center to get help filing an appeal.

Outreach to Faith-Based and Community Organizations

The Department of Homeland Security Center for Faith-Based and Neighborhood Partnerships is coordinating with national, state, and local partners in Florida to support recovery from Hurricane Ian. Center Director Marcus Coleman Jr. traveled to Florida to assess needs and provide support for efforts by faith-based and community organizations.

Operation Blue Roof

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, in coordination with FEMA, may be able to assist eligible homeowners with temporary roof repairs. Operation Blue Roof is a free service to homeowners impacted by Hurricane Ian in Charlotte, Collier, DeSoto, Lee, and Sarasota counties. Flood Insurance

If your policy has expired, you may be able to reinstate it if your renewal date was between Aug. 25, 2022, and Oct. 23, 2022. Policyholders whose NFIP policy renewal date is within this range should contact their agent or insurance company. The NFIP has extended the proof of loss requirement for policyholders who experienced flood damage from Hurricane Ian from the standard 60 days to 365 days from the date of loss. Debris Removal Guidelines for Private Residential Properties

In efforts to expedite the debris removal process, please follow these rules.

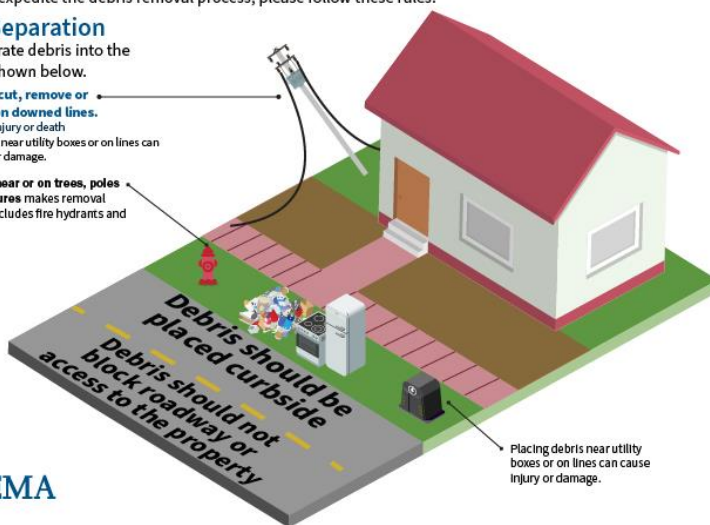
Debris Separation

Please separate debris into the categories shown below.

Never touch, cut, remove or place debris on downed lines.

- Can result in injury or death
- Placing debris near utility boxes or on lines can cause injury or damage.

Placing debris **near or on trees, poles or other structures** makes removal difficult. This includes fire hydrants and meters.



Placing debris near utility boxes or on lines can cause injury or damage.

Check with your local office of emergency management for more information on debris removal.



Large Appliances
Refrigerator, washer/dryer, air conditioner, stove, water heater, dishwasher. Do not leave doors unsealed or unsecured.



Construction Debris
Building materials, drywall, lumber, carpet, furniture, plumbing.



Vegetative Debris
Tree branches, leaves, logs, plants.



Electronics
Television, computer, stereo, phone, DVD player.



Hazardous Waste
Oil, battery, pesticide, paint, cleaning supplies, compressed gas.
